
Last Chance - Community Math Puzzle

Radical Acceptance Retreat at Green Gulch



Did you know 3rd Grade Teacher Laura Burges is also a Buddhist teacher at the San Francisco Zen Center? Her all day retreat at Green Gulch Farm on **Saturday, June 2**, from **10:00 am-5:00 pm**, will feature meditation instruction and opportunities for

sitting and walking meditation, as well as dharma talks, discussion, and a Green Gulch Farm lunch. We will also have walking meditation through the Green Gulch Gardens.

In this one day retreat, we will explore Tara Brach's book *Radical Acceptance*. We will look into ways in which we may unwittingly constrict our lives with self-judgment, addiction, perfectionism, overwork, and unrealistic expectations of self and others. How do we loosen these ties and find joy in accepting life on life's terms?

Common Sense Media Tip of the Week

It's hard to keep up with all of the hot new titles that our kids are begging to watch, download, and play -- and know whether we should let them.

Two of these titles keep coming up in the news, and maybe in your home, too: **Fortnite** and **13 Reasons Why**. Fortnite is a video game that's all the rage because it's fun, competitive, and fast-paced. There are opportunities for teamwork, but there's also plenty of violence. Because there are lots of ways to play -- including alone, with a partner, or with a group -- kids can have fun playing with friends. There's shooting -- though bloodless -- and open chat, so those are factors to consider when deciding if you want to let your kid play.

Kids might also be talking about the second season of *13 Reasons Why* which just released on Netflix. Since the series centers around the topic of suicide, it's definitely one to talk about with your kids before, during, and after viewing if you decide it's something they can watch. While it

definitely can open doors to meaningful conversations about some tough topics that teens often don't want to talk about with parents, it's also a complicated approach to one teen's suicide and the aftermath, and the second season introduces even more to unpack.

In both cases there are some great opportunities to both play and watch together -- for fun with Fortnite and for connection with 13 Reasons Why -- if you think they're a good fit for your family.
